There is an intention to further extend the flights premises to include a new large aviary along with enhanced public viewing. This will be a welcome improvement.

- 1. Day Diary entries should make it clear that morning checks indicate good health as well as any variation from normal.
- 2. Where possible more information with regard to the zoo's involvement with the overseas project would enhance the collection's appreciation by the public.
