This zoo was founded in 1963 initially as a private collection. It is now operated by a trust under the title of The National Zoological Society of Wales and is thus considered as the national collection of the principality. The collection includes mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, invertebrates and some fish. The zoo enjoys a considerable level of competence among its staff some of whom have been with the zoo for many years, and the CEO is widely experienced in zoo management and husbandry.

The zoo is located on the north coast of Wales in Colwyn bay. It occupies a north west facing hillside site above the town. The site is quite steep in places, quite densely wooded in some areas and the unusual geographic nature of the site allows for imaginative siting of animal enclosures and opportunities for environmental enrichment.

The zoo has a comprehensive mission statement and sets a high standard in terms of presentation of species, ambience of the collection and the welfare of the animals kept. The scale of the conservation, and research work achieved is commendable for an organisation of this size. The opening of the new Education Room facility (The WILD centre) is commended and offers new opportunities for increasing the educational range within the zoo. Several other completed or continuing refurbishment/ renewal programmes are noted. The management is highly competent and has put in place a system of delegation of responsibility that should ensure the ongoing high standard will be maintained.

The zoo well deserves its position as the National Zoo of Wales and is continuing to extend its facilities by the upgrading of many of its older exhibits. The latter if successful will be a major step forward in that it will provide not only new modern exotic animal facilities but will add some new and innovative architectural features to the zoo. We understand that the development of the proposed new reptile house has been further delayed by certain technical planning and funding issues that need resolution and hope that they will not inhibit the further improvement of the zoo. If this development is not carried forward then the management must consider suitable alternatives for the upgrading of that part of the collection. (See Direction)

The current achievements and improvements in enclosures and infrastructure are ongoing but much has been achieved since the last formal inspection. This is to be commended.

The use of the "Block codes", to extend the availability of information about the animals held in the zoo is a useful innovation and reflects the management's innovative and modern approach to the running of the zoo. More extensive use of electronic outreach is also planned.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

- 1. The food prep/store/ records office area is adjacent to the public access to the first aid centre and administrative office. Although this is delineated and marked by a rope barrier on which a "No entry" sign is displayed, the barrier is mobile to allow access for service during the day. At such times we recommend extra PROMINENT signage be placed in this area and that when not in immediate use the rope barrier is kept closed.
- 2. For clarity, it is recommended that the extensive programme of curative and preventive veterinary care includes measures for avian malaria in the schedules for penguins.
- 3. We recommend regular review of darting policies and procedures in conjunction with veterinary advisors, and ,if appropriate, North Wales Police.
