# Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence

**Strategy 2018-2023** 

**Update on Progress – June 2019** 

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#### 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Our North Wales vision:

That the people of North Wales can live safe, equal, violence-free lives, in communities without violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence.

North Wales is working together to tackle all aspects of Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence, based around 6 key objectives, underpinned by the national objectives enshrined in the 2015 Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (Wales) Act:

#### Prevention

**Objective 1**: Increase awareness and challenge attitudes of violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence across the North Wales population.

**Objective 2**: Increased awareness in children and young people of the importance of safe, equal and healthy relationships and that abusive behaviour is always wrong.

#### **Protection**

**Objective 3**: Increased focus on holding perpetrators to account and provide opportunities to change their behaviour based around victim safety.

*Objective 4:* Make early intervention and prevention a priority.

#### **Provision of support**

**Objective 5**: Relevant professionals are trained to provide effective, timely and appropriate responses to victims and survivors.

**Objective 6:** Provide victims with equal access to appropriately resourced, high quality, needs led, strength based, gender responsive services across North Wales.

The strategy will show that North Wales is committed to a collaborative, joined up approach to tackling these issues, through co-production of services and partnership working at all levels. Through clear and committed leadership by the North Wales VAWDASV Strategic Board, we will continue to prioritise best practice and ensure that resources are utilised according to the needs of our local communities.

This strategy will enable and support innovative practices and ideas, as well as supporting long-existing services, in order to provide a complete package of support for victims, survivors and their families. It will focus on holding perpetrators to account for their actions, as well as supporting families to build on their relationships and promote an ethos of safe, healthy relationships for all.

#### 2. Introduction

The North Wales Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Abuse Strategic Board met for the first time in December 2016 and the Regional Needs Assessment was completed in December 2017, which led to the development of the Regional Strategy early in 2018.

The regional strategy clearly shows that North Wales is committed to a collaborative, joined up approach to tackling VAWDASV, through co-production of services and partnership working at all levels. Through clear and committed leadership by the North Wales VAWDASV Strategic Board, we will continue to prioritise best practice (according to Safe Lives, Welsh Women's Aid and other Welsh government legislation and guidance) and ensure that resources are utilised according to the needs of our local communities. To meet this commitment, we will utilise the information from the needs assessment as well as regular meetings and updates with 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector providers to ensure that quality of provision remains high and from service user groups, to ensure services are fully meeting their needs.

The Needs Assessment was completed in December in 2017 and led to the development of the Regional Strategy early in 2018. We recognise that the Needs Assessment needs to be an ongoing, dynamic piece of work this is a piece of work currently being undertaken by the Regional Team.

The strategy has already enabled us to support innovative practices and ideas, (such as the Caring Dads intervention to support perpetrators of domestic abuse to become better parents) as well as supporting long-existing services, in order to provide a complete package of support for victims, survivors and their families. It will focus on holding perpetrators to account for their actions, as well as supporting families to build on their relationships and promote an ethos of safe, healthy relationships for all. We will be upscaling our perpetrator intervention (Choose2Change) where possible, which focusses on changing values and attitudes towards violence within relationships, but also working with the criminal justice services to support the conviction and rehabilitation of perpetrators though offering training to court staff. We continue to maintain high end services such as IDVA/ISVA, but we are also looking at more preventative and early intervention projects. The Regional Advisor is working with Education in some LAs to consider how the Whole Education Approach can be implemented to support culture change within schools, to make them more trauma informed.

#### 3. Governance

The aim of the North Wales VAWDASV Strategic Board is to work together in partnership to ensure the most efficient and effective response to preventing serious harm caused by violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence in the North Wales region and to implement and support the requirements of the Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (VAWDASV) Act (Wales) 2015. The Board was established in December 2016 and aims to develop, approve and monitor the regional strategy on violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence and to ensure that matters relating to VAWDASV as it relates to survivors, perpetrators, families and communities are effectively and strategically addressed in North Wales.

The current Chair of the Strategic Board is Stephen Hughes (OPCC) and the Vice Chair is Chris Weaver (BCUHB). These positions are held for two years.

#### 4. Specific areas of progress

#### 4.1 Development of Subgroups

Following the development of the Strategic Board in late 2016, three main Subgroups have also been created to feed into the Board and provide operational support. The Terms of Reference for the groups have been developed and although the Regional Advisor chairs the groups currently, the new chairs will be elected during the summer of 2019. The regional team will continue to service these groups and provide all support required.

The Female Genital Mutilation/Forced Marriage/Honour Based Violence Subgroup was established in June 2017 and the group worked during 2018/19 on establishing more coherent pathways of support for FGM, HBV, FM victims and their families across the region. This group will be re-invigorated during 2019/20 and the remit will be based around how to utilise shared funding going forward into 2020. The group consists of members from North Wales Police, Local Authority (Social Services), BCUHB and the specialist 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector (BAWSO). The group will also consider specific cases, where appropriate, especially if they have caused issues with partnership working or lack of funding/support. If specific trends are identified, these will be fed back to the Strategic Board for consideration.

The Regional Training Subgroup met for the first time on 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2018; it is made up of all relevant authorities, as well as North Wales Police and reflects the wide variety of training support for employees and partners across North Wales. The Group is responsible for all VAWDASV training across North Wales, as well as the Regional Training Plan. The group is currently working with the Regional Training and Development Officer, to develop a project plan for the roll out of Groups 2 and 3 of the National Training Framework across the region. The first cohort of Group 2 Train the Trainers is due to commence in July 2019, followed by another in September 2019.

The Joint Commissioning Subgroup met for the first time on 6<sup>th</sup> March 2018. The Joint Commissioning Group is made up of a variety of commissioners from across the relevant authorities as well as 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector partners and this has led to a thorough and robust joint commissioning process. The group has developed the sub-regional IDVA specification, which is currently going through the procurement process. They are also working on re-invigorating the Needs Assessment/Gap Analysis, to turn this into a dynamic project which continues to reflect the needs of the local population in North Wales.

#### 4.2 Regional IDVA provision

One of the main areas of development for the Strategic Board has been the development of a more consistent regional Independent Domestic Violence Advisor (IDVA) provision.

The IDVA provision in North Wales has historically been provided by the specialist (3<sup>rd</sup>) sector and the funding has been piecemeal, with some provision having up to three different funders. This has led to inconsistencies in provision, as each provider is attempting to meet the local needs of high risk victims, at the same time as achieving outcomes required by a range of different commissioners. These outcomes can vary dramatically depending on the funding source and can lead to a dilution of the service.

The Strategic Board tasked the Joint Commissioning Group with considering the current provision and Safe Lives recommendations, as well as local needs and develop a specification for a regional provision, which directly meets the needs of the local populations, at the same time as ensuring that the provision delivers best practice. In order to retain local expertise and knowledge, it was agreed that the region would be split into sub-regions (Wrexham and Flintshire, Conwy and Denbighshire, Gwynedd and Ynys Mon) and that a lead provider would be asked to tender for one, two or all three regions. It is anticipated that specialist providers would work collaboratively, to ensure that local needs are met. This model was intended to reduce overheads and ensure consistency, at the same time as retaining local expertise.

The Specification has been developed and the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (acting on behalf of the Strategic Board) are currently undertaking the procurement process. An IDVA Job Description has also been developed, again to promote consistency and ensure that Safe Lives recommendations are adhered to. IDVAs should be providing support to high risk victims and supporting the through the criminal justice system, if that is what is required. We want to ensure that this is their role across the region and that the level of provision available is not a postcode lottery.

This development comes at a time of flux within the whole coordinated community response to VAWDASV and a review of the MARAC (Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conference) process across the region. North Wales Police are working with the Strategic Board and the 3<sup>rd</sup> sector to ensure that MARACs are consistent across the region and to manage the high levels of cases currently being presented. We envisage the redevelopment of the IDVA provision to fit into this restructure of the whole MARAC process.

#### 4.3 Partnership working

The North Wales VAWDASV Strategic Board was developed out of the Gender-based Violence Forum, previously meeting quarterly and made up of Community Safety Partnership leads, 3<sup>rd</sup> sector providers, as well as North Wales Police, health, probation and a number of other partners.

The Strategic Board has a developed Terms of Reference and manages the VAWDASV Welsh Government grant centrally (this previously went to individual Local Authorities and there was no consistency in what was commissioned).

Through engagement with partners and other commissioners, the Board also commissions part of the OPCC funding, relating to VAWDASV, as well as some Supporting People and Area Planning Board funding. This has been a major achievement and is a result of strong relationship and partnership building across the region.

The Chair of the Strategic Board and the Regional Advisor have also been working with the Regional Safeguarding Boards to ensure that the regional VAWDASV Strategy guides VAWDASV decision making across the region, regardless of where the individual funding derives from.

The Regional Advisor attends the Third Sector Specialist Services Forum, which meets a week before the Strategic Board, to ensure good and clear communication between the 3<sup>rd</sup> sector specialist providers and the Board. This group is chaired by Eleri Butler (CEO of Welsh Women's Aid) and supported by WWA. This meeting enables all specialist services to be made aware of the work of the Board, but also for real two-way communication as they can ensure their views are taken to the Board immediately. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector representatives on the Board are able to fully inform the Board of any issues/concerns in a timely manner.

A member of the Regional Team also attends the Local MARAC Steering Groups and VAWDASV forums, to ensure that local issues are fed back into the Regional Board.

The issue of Survivor Voice is extremely important to the Strategic Board and survivor involvement at all levels has been considered. The Board have agreed to currently utilise existing Survivor Forums linked to 3<sup>rd</sup> sector groups to provide support/consultation and information to the Board. The Regional Team will be working closely with Welsh Government on the development of the Survivor Engagement Framework and will then work with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector in North Wales to ensure that all affected by VAWDASV are having their voices heard. The Board is currently sourcing funding to support the development of a group similar to SEEDS (Survivors Empowering and Educating Services) in South Wales.

#### 4.4 Working with perpetrators

One of the Board's priorities for 2019/20 has been the redevelopment of the current work with perpetrators across North Wales. We have been working closely with Dr Cerys Miles and Linsey Waters (Welsh Government) to look at what is currently being provided and how we can develop this area to greater meet the needs of victims and their families at the same time as ensuring perpetrators are held to account for their actions.

The North Wales Needs Assessment showed the imbalance in funding for work with perpetrators compared to victims across the region and we recognise that without early intervention with both victims and perpetrators, we are not going to break the cycle of abuse.

It is clear that the Needs Assessment was very victim focussed and we need to look at a much more targeted gaps analysis, looking at the journey of the perpetrator from community provision through to the gates of HMP Berwyn. The main aim is to have a shared understanding of what works and what is needed in the region, with a particular focus on early intervention and prevention. The Board have established a Task and Finish Group to undertake this work, made up of 3<sup>rd</sup> sector providers, CRC, NPS, HMP Berwyn and other interested partners. The group will consider current research relating to this service user group, as well as looking at current provision and any gaps, with the aim of creating long-term, sustainable impact.

There is very little community based intervention for perpetrators of VAWDASV across North Wales. The Board currently part-fund the Respect accredited Choose2Change programme (run by Relate), which is run in Wrexham, Flintshire and Conwy. They also support the Caring Dads programme which is aimed at re-connecting abusive fathers with their children and this is run in Ynys Mon, Gwynedd and Denbighshire. The Board recognise the need to upscale these community-based programmes, in order to meet our early intervention targets.

The Regional Advisor has been working with a range of providers to look at targeted preventive programmes with young people and is hoping to pilot this during 2019/20 (funding dependent) with a group from Youth Justice within the region.

North Wales Police are currently implementing the ADAPT (Agencies Domestic Abuse Perpetrator Tasking) programme (based on the MATAC process used in Northumbria, Humberside, and other North East regions). This will identify the highest risk, serial offenders and encourage diversionary actions where appropriate. It will also help to highlight victims and children affected by VAWDASV and working with partners, ensure that appropriate services are in place.

#### 4.5 National Training Framework

The North Wales Strategic Board (and Regional Training Subgroup) have been working to implement the National Training Framework across all relevant authorities.

The Strengthening Leadership Series (Group 6) is available for all public service leaders and the specialist services have been given the opportunity to complete appropriate training at groups 4 and 5.

During this time, the "relevant authorities" staff have been undertaking Group 1 VAWDASV awareness e-learning (and face to face training, where appropriate). This has been adopted across North Wales and the completion rates are climbing all the time, with 90% of Denbighshire staff trained and a number of the other local authorities not far behind. There have been some challenges working with staff that do not have regular access to IT equipment and for sessional workers and those on short-term contracts, but Local Authorities have found local solutions that suit their workforce. This has included face to face sessions, use of the workbook, and trainer led learning.

Groups 2 and 3 of the Framework (Ask and Act) has been rolled out in North Wales since April 2019. The Regional Training Group have put together a Regional Plan for roll out, but this has been a challenging project, due to the need for a commitment of substantial resources from the relevant authorities. The Regional Training Group meets quarterly and feeds any issues directly into the Strategic Board and the Board have fed any concerns back to Senior Management via the Regional Safer Communities Board. The figures required for training given in the Regional Training Plan, mean that we will need to deliver six cohorts of Group 2 Train the Trainers during 2019/20 and three Group 3.

We have a cohort of Group 2 Train the Trainers being trained in July 2019. The group is made up of 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector representatives, Workforce Development and Benefits and Revenues in Flintshire, Social Services and Corporate Training in Anglesey, and Education in Gwynedd. We have another cohort of learners due to start their Group 2 Train the Trainer course in September, from Education in Flintshire and the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector. We are hoping that the success of these groups will encourage other service areas from across the region to undertake the training during the Autumn of 2019 and Spring 2020.
