Consultation Report on the Proposed Amalgamation of Ysgol Maelgwn & Ysgol Nant y Coed

Llandudno Junction, Conwy and the Temporary Arrangements until the new School Building on the Esgyryn Site is Available for Occupation

June 2016



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1. Introduction

Conwy County Borough Council has recently completed a period of Consultation in relation to the proposal to close Ysgol Maelgwn and Ysgol Nant y Coed as of the 31st August 2016 and establish a new School as of 1st September 2016. The consultation period began on the 11th May 2016 and came to a close on the 22nd June 2016.

The Consultation has been carried out in accordance with the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 which requires the School Organisation Code 2013 to be adhered to and gives guidance to relevant bodies (Welsh Ministers, Local Authorities, Governing Bodies).

This document will set out the steps taken during the Consultation Period, will refer to findings obtained during the Consultation and will aim to answer and tackle queries that have been put to the Authority.

The consultation was in two parts. Part one was a repeat of a previous consultation for the closure of Ysgol Maelgwn and Ysgol Nant y Coed on 31st August and the establishment of a new dual stream community primary school on the 1st September. Part two was a consultation on the temporary arrangements for the education of the pupils until the new school building on the Esgyryn site is available.

None of the consultation responses received made reference to part one of the Consultation.

2. Consultation

2.1 Publication of the Consultation

The Consultation Document was published on the Conwy County Borough Council webpages bilingually. The table below sets out the list of recipients, as guided by the School Organisation Code, who received a link to the Consultation Document.

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2.2 Consultation Exhibition

The Local Authority did not hold a public meeting as part of this consultation, however, the Temporary Governing body did hold an exhibition event between 3pm – 7pm, Thursday, 26th May and 9.30am – 1pm, Friday, 27th May at Conwy Business Centre to assist stakeholders with understanding how the different options may affect the education of the pupils. This event was facilitated by the Conwy Education Authority and staff from Conwy's Education Services were available to take consultation responses.

The event was attended by a total of 89 stakeholders who registered their attendance on a register.

The exhibition outlined the evidence that the Temporary Governing Body had assessed prior to reaching its recommendation that infants pupils should be educated at the current Nant y Coed site and Junior pupils at the current Ysgol Maelgwn site.

The photos below show the nature of the exhibition.



2.3 Consultation with Children

A children's Consultation Document was prepared so that children could have an opportunity to share their feelings about the options available and to make any comments they would wish to make.

The Children's Consultation was shared with the School Councils of both schools. And the members of the School Councils were asked prior to any discussion which option under Part 2 of the consultation they favoured.

Following discussion and questions, the pupils were again asked to express their preference under Part 2 of the consultation.

Feedback received from the pupils showed that they were aware of the proposal to amalgamate the two schools and that a new school would be built on a new site in Llandudno Junction.

Pupils were also aware of the delay in the building of the new school and were aware of options available for their education from September, 2016 until such time as the new building would be available.

The contents of the Children's Consultation Document is outlined in Appendix 1 to this document.

3. Consultation Feedback

During the course of the Consultation Period Conwy Education Services received responses from stakeholder as outlined in the table below:

3.1 Numerical Analysis of feedback

The consultation document provided prospective respondents with a form to allow them to make their consultation responses known to the authority and also contained a specific consultation question as follows:

"Do you agree with the Temporary Governing Body that an arrangement whereby the Foundation Phase (infants) pupils would be educated on the Nant y Coed site and the Key Stage 2 (junior) pupils would be educated on the Maelgwn site is the best option for the education of the children and for establishing the new school on a sound footing?" A breakdown of the responses to the specific question are shown in the following graphs.

The children's consultation responses and those of GwE, Estyn and the Trade Unions will be dealt with separately.



Graph showing all responses to the specific question for all responses received. The blue column represents responses where no answer was provided for this question.

The overall response can be seen to be 69 respondents not in agreement with the option of educating the Infants pupils on the Nant y Coed site and the Junior pupils on the Maelgwn site with 62 in agreement. 3 respondents stated that they were neither in favour nor against whilst a further 3 did not respond to this question.

Further breakdown of the overall responses has been undertaken. The following graph shows the breakdown by whether or not the respondent stated that they had read the consultation document. This shows that of those that stated that they had read the consultation document, 60 did not agree with the Temporary Governing Body's preferred option whilst 48 agreed. Of those that stated they had not read the consultation document however, 5 disagreed with the TGB's favoured option whilst 10 agreed.

An examination of these responses shows that 5 were staff, one was another interested party and 9 were parents of children currently at the school.



Graph of responses where the respondent had stated that they had read the consultation document.

Analysis was also undertaken of responses where the respondent stated that they had attended the exhibition on the Consultation. The results of this analysis is shown in the graph below.





This analysis shows that where a consultee stated that they had not attended the consultation exhibition, 38 agreed with the Temporary Governing Body's recommended option with 26 not in agreement.

For those that had attended the exhibition, 19 agreed with the Temporary Governing Body's preferred option whilst 40 disagreed. This would seem to suggest that where respondents had attended the exhibition they were less likely to agree with the Temporary Governing Body's preferred option.

Finally analysis was undertaken on the responses by type of consultee.



Graph of responses by type of consultee

This graph shows that of the respondents who stated they were parents of children currently at the school, 43 agreed with the Temporary Governing Body's preferred option whilst 60 did not agree.

This is in contrast to those who stated that they were staff at one of the two schools where 11 were in agreement with the Temporary Governing Body's preferred option with one against and one who did not respond to the question.

Whereas the numbers are very low, the responses by all the other types of respondent were 8 in agreement with the Temporary Governing Body's preferred option and 9 not in agreement.

3.2 Analysis of respondent comments and the Authority's responses

All of the comments received from respondents and the authority's responses are attached as appendix 2.

The comments can broadly be placed into the following groups:

• Transport issues and arranging to have children in the correct site at the correct time

- Emotional wellbeing of pupils and difficulty coping with change
- The fact that any proposal is only for a short time
- Disruption causing a decline in educational standards
- Short timescale to notify any changes to parents
- Bullying and 'them and us'

Detailed responses to all the individual issues raised and comments made have been included in Appendix 2.

3.3 NAS/UWT Union Feedback

The response received from the NAS/UWT union centred around the delay being harmful to learners, staff and the education and around the Health and Safety responsibilities of the authority.

The authority is entirely aware of its Health and Safety responsibilities towards staff and this would be borne in mind whichever option is selected as the temporary arrangement from September, 2016.

3.4 NUT Union feedback

The response received from the NUT union centred around stress to staff and the short time that teachers would have to prepare whichever option is selected as well as the concerns about staff workloads.

The responses to the points raised are that the Authority is fully aware that the late consultation is less than satisfactory. As such, the Council is more than happy to work with staff to assist them to make whichever option work.

The education authority is considering the option of delaying the start of the start of the school term in September to allow more time for staff to make whatever changes are required. However, it would be expected that the school would still be open for the statutory minimum number of school days.

3.4 ESTYN Feedback

Estyn's summary of its feedback was as follows:

"Part one of the proposal does not contain enough information on the current standards of the leadership, provision or pupil outcomes. As a result, Estyn cannot make a judgement as to whether the proposal to amalgamate the two schools is likely to maintain the current standards of education and provision in the area. Part two of the proposal does not provide enough information on leadership and staffing structure or the number of families likely to have children at two sites. As a result, Estyn cannot make a judgement as to whether the interim proposals are likely to at least maintain the current standards of education and provision in the area."

Specific points raised include the following:-

"The proposer makes a strong case that the benefits of its preferred option (1a - to go ahead with the amalgamation of staff and pupils with Foundation Phase on one

site and key stage 2 on the other for the interim period) outweigh the advantages of second interim option (3 – postpone the amalgamation of staff and pupils until the new build is complete). It reasonably asserts that amalgamating classes and teaching groups will allow pupils to settle with their peers and teachers, allow teachers to collaborate on new curriculum arrangements, and senior leaders to begin the management of a single school. It takes appropriate consideration of and proposes reasonable solutions to the risks to travel arrangements for parents who will have pupils in different key stages, the upheaval that may be caused to pupils with additional learning needs and the burden of moving twice."

And

"The proposal contains a very detailed risk assessment. This covers both options, a consideration of the impact on travel arrangements, the educational benefits and risks, and the impact on Welsh language development. The categorisation of risk before and after consideration of mitigating factors is somewhat complicated and this does not aid the clarity of the proposals. It appears that most risks have been categorised appropriately and the council has identified suitable actions to mitigate them."

3.5 Children's feedback

The responses from children on the School Council of both Ysgol Maelgwn and Ysgol Nant y Coed to the question of which option they preferred after a discussion of the children's consultation document were as follows:

Nant y Coed -

0 – wish to remain the same

1 – not sure

9 - in favour of the split of Foundation phase and Key Stage 2

Maelgwn -

0 - wish to remain the same

2 - not sure

9 in favour of the split of Foundation phase and Key Stage 2

3.6 GwE Feedback

The GwE feedback was as follows:

"The GwE Senior Challenge Advisor and Challenge Advisor favour option 1a.

The reasons for this include:

• The management team would be able to commence their work from the beginning. Strategic meetings would be easier to hold and the school's new strategic documentation would focus on the standards for the two Key Stages

- The pupils would be in their correct classes and would have the opportunity to settle with their peers/teachers. This will ensure a better progression as the new school opens.
- The teachers of the Key Stages would be on the same site and would be able to meet and work together daily e.g. on the school's new curriculum, literacy skills frameworks, numeracy and digital skills.
- An opportunity for the staff that will be working together to come to know each other sooner. Again, this will facilitate co-working when the new school opens.
- Ensuring that there is not an 'Us and Them' mind-set at the start of the time in the new building the partnership would start from the outset.
- Tracking of children, intervention, the use of support resources and the recognition of individuals and target groups would be easier to manage.
- The school can plan and develop systems for transferring children from the Foundation Phase to Key Stage 2. These systems would be available for the full opening in 2017.
- An opportunity for parents to get to know each other sooner and to contribute to the life of the new school."

4. Cabinet Decision

Conwy County Borough Council Cabinet Members met on the 28th June, 2016 to discuss the Consultation for the Proposed Amalgamation of Ysgol Maelgwn & Ysgol Nant y Coed and the Temporary Arrangements from September, 2016 until such time as the new building will be available on the Esgyryn site.

Having been provided with the information gathered through the Consultation, Conwy Cabinet gave approval to formally publish the Statutory Notice for determining the amalgamation of Ysgol Maelgwn & Ysgol Nant y Coed. This consists of a 28 day formal Objection Period whereby any objections to the proposal must be made in writing. Following this the Local Authority will return to Cabinet to determine the final decision.

The Cabinet has also considered the options for the temporary location of pupils until such a time as the new school building on the Esgyryn Site will be available and have resolved as follows:

That the Foundation Phase pupils will be educated on the existing Nant y Coed site and the Key Stage 2 pupils will be educated on the existing Maelgwn site will be published in the statutory notice.

What struck me as I read the document, there was no mention of a risk assessment if children are transported by a 'walking bus' through Llandudno Junction and that in the Winter months. As a parent have no objection to building a new school and even having to buy a new school uniform for two children (when the new school is not even ready). What I do object to is the way that many families are being forced to adapt / change arrangements to suit the feelings of staff. There is NOT enough information presented about the new arrangement (of splitting the infants and junior sections), and mainly how it can be assured that my children will be carried from one site to the other completely safely.

Currently both my children attend Ysgol Maelgwn Both have settled in their classes and have become used to the situation there.

I do not see sufficient evidence in the consultation document to persuade me that the need for staff to prepare and work as a team is more important than the safety and happiness of my children.

The idea of separating the infants and junior children is unnecessary. It will mean moving (for the staff and children) at least twice and it will certainly confuse/worry the younger son to know that his big sister won't be on the same site. Also we depend on other parents at the moment to take our children to Ysgol Maelgwn. Under the new arrangements it places additional stress on them also to transport children to Maelgwn and Nant y Coed.

The breakfast club is not an option as we start work before 8 in the morning. Also there was not much mention of the after school clubs – I want my children to attend the SAME club, but how are they to transport children from one site to the other – again NO risk assessment. In my opinion, in the relatively short time until Ysgol Awel y

Mynydd is ready, the best option is to keep the current

Estyn's response to the proposal for the amalgamation of Ysgol Maelgwn and Ysgol Nant Y Coed to create a new school in Llandudno Junction and the temporary arrangements until the new school building on the Esgyryn site is available for occupation.

This report has been prepared by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Education and Training in Wales.

Under the terms of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and its associated Code, proposers are required to send consultation documents to Estyn. However Estyn is not a body which is required to act in accordance with the Code and the Act places no statutory requirements on Estyn in respect of school organisation matters. Therefore as a body being consulted, Estyn will provide their opinion only on the overall merits of school organisation proposals.

Estyn has considered the educational aspects of the proposal and has produced the following response to the information provided by the proposer and other additional information such as data from Welsh Government and the views of the Regional Consortia which deliver school improvement services to the schools within the proposal.

Introduction

The consultation proposal is from Conwy County Borough Council. The proposal is divided into two parts. Part one is to establish a new Community Primary School in Llandudno Junction through the amalgamation of Ysgol Maelgwn and Ysgol Nant y Coed. Conwy Borough Council is currently in the process of building a new school on a new site in Llandudno Junction as part of the Welsh Government's 21st Century Schools Programme. If the proposal is successful, the two schools will amalgamate in September 2016. Part two of the proposal concerns interim accommodation and organisation of the new school until the site of the new school is ready.

Summary/ Conclusion

Part one of the proposal does not contain enough information on the current

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standards of the leadership, provision or pupil outcomes. As a result, Estyn cannot make a judgement as to whether the proposal to amalgamate the two schools is likely to maintain the current standards of education and provision in the area. Part two of the proposal does not provide enough information on leadership and staffing structure or the number of families likely to have children at two sites. As a result, Estyn cannot make a judgement as to whether the interim proposals are likely to at least maintain the current standards of education and provision in the area. Description and benefits

Part one of the proposal is a restatement of the proposal to amalgamate Ysgol Maelgwn and Ysgol Nant Y Coed and to build a new school on the new site Esgyryn

that was concluded in April 2015. Due to a delay in completion of the new site, the temporary governing body of the new school and the local authority are required to resubmit their proposals to include interim arrangements while the site is completed. Estyn's response to part one of this proposal remains unchanged. It found that the proposal contained an appropriate rationale and a suitable description of expected benefits.

□ the proposer had made a reasonable case that the proposal will lead to improved school facilities for all pupils, including improved provision for groups of vulnerable learners, for example a bilingual Specific Language Impairment resource for key stage 1 pupils.

- □ a lack of clarity over future leadership
- □ insufficient consideration of the impact on current and future staffing

arrangements

□ insufficient own evaluation by the local authority of leadership, provision and outcomes at the two schools

□ insufficient consideration of the impact on pupils entitled to free school meals

As a result, Estyn felt that it was difficult to judge whether the standards of education are likely to be maintained or improved in the new setting.

On review of the current proposal, the proposer has not provided any further clarity on the future leadership arrangements for the new school. With regards to staffing, the proposer asserts that a significant proportion of the work of establishing a staffing structure for the two amalgamated schools has already been undertaken under the original proposal. However, the current proposal does not provide details of the new staffing structure. The proposal does not provide a clear analysis of current performance information or an evaluation by the local authority of the quality of provision or capacity of leadership.

Given that the main shortcomings identified are still present in the current proposal, it remains difficult for Estyn to judge whether the standards of education are likely to be at least maintained in the newly established setting.

Part two of the proposal considers two options for interim educational arrangements for the new school on the current sites from September 2016 as the construction of the new build is not yet complete.

The proposer makes a strong case that the benefits of its preferred option (1a - to go ahead with the amalgamation of staff and pupils with Foundation Phase on one site and key stage 2 on the other for the interim period) outweigh the advantages of second interim option (3 – postpone the amalgamation of staff and pupils until the new build is complete). It reasonably asserts that amalgamating classes and teaching groups will allow pupils to settle with their peers and teachers, allow teachers to collaborate on new curriculum arrangements, and senior leaders to begin the management of a single school. It takes appropriate consideration of and proposes reasonable solutions to the risks to travel arrangements for parents who will have pupils in different key stages, the upheaval that may be caused to pupils with additional learning needs and the burden of moving twice.

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The proposal contains a very detailed risk assessment. This covers both options, a consideration of the impact on travel arrangements, the educational benefits and risks, and the impact on Welsh language development. The categorisation of risk before and after consideration of mitigating factors is somewhat complicated and this does not aid the clarity of the proposals. It appears that most risks have been categorised appropriately and the council has identified suitable actions to mitigate them.

As the council has not provided its own view of the capacity of leadership, and the quality of provision and outcomes for either school, it is difficult for Estyn to comment on whether standards of education will be at least maintained during interim

arrangements.

The proposer does not identify the exact number of families affected by having children at different sites during the interim phase, and therefore it is difficult to assess the true impact of the proposals on travel arrangements.

The impact on Welsh medium provision the actions proposed to mitigate against this risk are contained in a separate impact assessment and are not set out in the

proposal. Therefore the proposal itself does not provide enough information for Estyn to judge whether interim arrangements would have a detrimental impact on the Welsh medium education for the pupils concerned during the interim period.
